Bourke directed the team well and was able to keep the strong Kintetsu defense in two minds, varying between his powerful runs with ball in hand and creative passing and running, keeping the Kintetsu structure second guessing. Back rower Broadhurst, hooker Takizawa and no.10 replacement Ellison had notably impressive games which impacted heavily in the teams go forward.

There were two tries against the run of play, the first a timely intercept by Shota Yamamoto for a 50 meter sprint to the line and in the second half Ricoh lock Pohiva Latoahea managed to outrun the cover defense and sprint away for an outstanding individual effort to score in the corner after some excellent defense in the buildup.

Defensive line speed and counter ruck were a highlight of the game and continues to be a focus for the Rams going into the rest of the games in the season. However, despite last minute attempts made by the Liners, the Rams came away with the 4 tries to 1 win, picking up a handy bonus point and placing them on the top of the table.
